resistivity machine to took for archaeological remains

A new chapter of the society's history began at the annual meeting on April 13 with the election of an enlarged committee to cope with the increasing activities of members. There are now nine committee members. They are listed below, some with their phone numbers and emails in case people want to contact them.

The Research Group met the week following the annual meeting and decided the priority was to complete and publish the work already in progress. This includes the transcription of the Mary Bassett School logbook dating from 1863; the place names of the town; the parish registers of Leighton Buzzard and the building surveys of the High Street. In addition members decided to finish cataloguing the collection of maps belonging to the society so members can use them.

There are two books due to be published by the society. The first is on Leighton Buzzard and Linslade in the Civil War and the second is a children's book based on the Bassett family in Victorian Leighton Buzzard, Leight Day, Leig

Other work in progress includes listing and describing the ever-growing collection of photographs belonging to the society, many of them donated by members. The new committee is already considering next year's Transactions. We have some articles in progress but any members who wish to submit ideas or pieces would be welcome.

Four articles written by society members have appeared in the Leighton Buzzard Observer this year. The latest on the sand industry appeared on May 3. Next month the topic will be Leighton in World War One. Volunteers are needed to research the following two articles. The first is about the town between the wars, including Spinney Pool, Leighton's more than Olympic size sandpit lido, the town's 1930s cycling craze and the depression years. Help can be given with material and photographs already in the society's possession. The second article is about transport - the railway, canal, and the amazing fleet of lorries that were based in Leighton Buzzard in the middle of the last century. Pictures are available.
