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The Local Coprolite industry - 9th January 2008 - Barry Horne

Barry told us about how he had become aware of this almost forgotten industry and how he met Bernard O'Connor, the World expert. He explained how this meeting had led to him identifying some of the fields in Buckinghamshire which were "coprolited". He showed how Earl Brownlow tried to conserve the countryside, and way of life, by the restrictions placed on the coproliters.

Archives – Bringing the past to life - 13th February 2008 – Sue Baxter

Sue gave a fascinating talk about the records held at County Record Offices which can be used to investigate the history of a house and street. Particular reference was made to the houses, and the people who lived in them, in the area around Regent Street, Leighton Buzzard. A tantalising reference was made to a shooting at a school.

Fossil Mammals of the Ouzel Valley - 12th March 2008 - Andy Currant

Andy told us about the fabulous fossil mammal finds made over a period of years at the Pitstone Quarries, Marsworth and a remarkable nineteenth century find of a mammoth skeleton at Leighton Buzzard, now in the University Museum of Natural History at Oxford. He brought along various fossil teeth for the audience to examine.

Adventures in Science and Art - 9th April 2008 - Prof Richard Hark. Followed by the AGM

Dr Richard Hark's illuminating talk demonstrated how the apparently different disciplines of science and art come together both in the creation of works of art and in the detective work involved in authenticating them.

One might think that the beauty of a work of art lies in the artist's talent for putting paint on canvas or wielding a tool to create a figurine or statue but there is far more to it than that. The skill of the artist also lies in the chemical composition of pigments and alloys, the light effects of building up layers of paint, the melting points of the different metals involved in creating bronzes and a detailed knowledge of how to adjust the process if things start to go wrong.

Similarly, science plays its part in tracing the history of an item and detecting forgeries or alterations. Scientific analysis may show that a forger has used a pigment which was not available to the artist he is copying or x-rays might reveal earlier images beneath the layers of paint. Even carbon-dating can be used, as was seen in the recent tests on the Turin Shroud. The only limitation to the use of Science in Art appears to be that although science can suggest or sometimes prove a fake, it cannot as yet positively authenticate the real thing.

Olney, the Cowper Museum & Historic Gardens - 14th May 2008 - Elizabeth Knight

The May meeting of the Society was entertained by two speakers from the Cowper and Newton Museum at Olney in north Bucks. Mrs Elizabeth Knight, a trustee of the independent museum, took us through the sometimes difficult life of the poet William Cowper who lived from 1731 to 1800. For a key part of his adult life - between 1768 and 1786 -he lived in Olney with the radical preacher and curate of Olney John Newton, 1725-1807, ex-slave trader and best remembered today as the author of the hymn Amazing Grace. He became a leading campaigner for the abolition of the slave trade along with William Wilberforce. The house they shared overlooking Olney's market place is the home today of a great many objects associated with their lives.

Cowper was also a keen gardener and kept a number of pets including three hares. The second part of the talk by Elizabeth's husband took us round the restored garden, planted with many rare and old varieties of flowers and vegetables that would have been familiar to Cowper and Newton. Their summer house has also been restored and can be visited.

Chairman's Remarks

We have maintained the high standard of talks with some first class speakers. The number of members, and non-members, attending has been encouragingly high. For winter 2008/9 we have tried to put together a varied programme to appeal to all tastes and I would urge you to come along to all the talks, even those not "up your street". You never know what you might learn.
