Fieldwork - 2009

We have not yet finalised a programme of field activities. It is our intention to excavate in Leighton Buzzard itself to investigate its early history. Unfortunately the areas behind the buildings fronting the High Street are a concrete jungle so no test pitting I'm afraid.

It is our intention to continue our test pitting programme in Heath and Reach.

Research Forum

This new venture, launched to encourage people to become actively involved in local history research, has got off to a good start. Three areas of research are being pursued at the moment. The largest team are studying Leighton Buzzard and Linslade place-names and their derivation. During this study the team have studied maps (ancient and modern), documents and previous studies. Another group are studying the baptism, marriage and death statistics using published copies of the registers. A smaller group are attempting to investigate "Linslade: The Victorian boom town. Where did the people come from?" using the census returns.

A number of afternoon Forum meetings have been held at St Barnabas Church Hall. Initially these were working meetings but we are now at the stage where the work is carried out at people's houses and the Library. Future meetings of the Forum will probably concentrate on reporting work in progress and results. Joan Schneider attended one meeting and told those present about her researches into the History of the nearby village of Tilsworth and the sources used.

The group made a visit to Leighton Buzzard Library Local History section where Hilary gave a very talk and notes.

Progress so far is very encouraging and we would like to see more people joining in this hands-on activity.

Summary of Past Events

"New Discoveries in Leighton's Past" - Paul Brown - January 14th 2009

Paul told us about the new information which came to light while he was writing his latest book, "Leighton Buzzard and Linslade: A History", and how the history of the area is being constantly rewritten as new facts come to light and old facts are reinterpreted.

"Mystery Photographs of Leighton" - February 18th 2009

The Society held an evening devoted to mystery photographs of the town and district. Where and when were they taken? What and who do they show? Members and members of the public brought along their own mystery photographs for people to try to identify them.

"Leighton's Treasures" - James Collett-White - March 11th 2009

James told us about the wealth of material held in the Bedfordshire and Luton Archives in Bedford and how it can be used to discover the history of the town as well as streets, individual buildings and people.

Visit to Bedfordshire and Luton Archive Records Service - March 12th 2009

This was a morning guided tour of the archives by two members of staff. Many documents and maps relevant to the area were laid out in the search room. We are grateful to BLARS for their time.

The Ordnance Survey - Mike Clarke and AGM - April 8th 2009 Mike, a retired Ordnance surveyor, told us about the Ordnance Survey from a personal perspective and about the

training and work to produce the maps with which we are all familiar in the days before modern techniques. He told many amusing anecdotes of his life as a surveyor and I'm sure many of us still chuckle at his description of him pedalling furiously down an RAF runway on his bicycle, to measure its length, while members of the public looked on hoping to see the latest secret aeroplane. He told us of his quest to locate the bench marks on the buildings of Leighton Buzzard and Linslade which are shown on the large scale maps. The coming of the digital age has rendered them unnecessary to the Survey.
